GENERAL INFORMATION

Title of Project: Market and Feasibility Study for Housing for Veterans or their families who are at risk of homelessness or are homeless Project at the Hot Springs VA Medical Center, Hot Springs, South Dakota.

Background: The purpose of this Performance Work Statement (PWS) is to obtain a market and feasibility study to enable the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to determine if an Enhanced-Use Lease (EUL) supportive housing project is feasible in a manner that maximizes available benefits to VA. The EUL Authority, Title 38 United States Code Sections 8161-8169, allows VA to outlease facilities (available land, buildings, and other resources) to provide supportive housing that engages tenants in on-site and community-based support services for Veterans or their families who are at risk of homelessness or are homeless. EULs are long-term leases (up to 75 years) of facilities under VA's jurisdiction of control to the public or private sector. This program is administrated by VA's Office of Asset Enterprise Management (OAEM).

OAEM follows instructions and guidance issued by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), and other agency instruction and guidance containing specific capital asset performance metrics. Multi-functional Contractor support services are needed to assist OAEM in a variety of functions that support EUL projects in accordance with the Title 38, U. S. Code 38 USC §§ 8161-8169 and other related laws and directives. Under the EUL Authority, VA is not required to follow the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) or the Veterans Affairs Acquisition Regulation (VAAR), when selecting the enhanced-use lease lessee, but use of the FAR/VAAR as guidelines ensures integrity of the selection process.

The VA Black Hills Health Care System (BHHCS) is located in western South Dakota. VA BHHCS provides primary and secondary medical and surgical care, along with residential rehabilitation treatment program (RRTP) services, extended nursing home care and tertiary psychiatric inpatient care services, for Veterans residing in South Dakota and portions of Nebraska, North Dakota, Wyoming and Montana. Care is delivered through the Fort Meade and Hot Springs VA Medical Centers, as well as through a number of community based outpatient and rural outreach clinics. VA BHHCS is part of VA Midwest Health Care Network.

VA BHHCS supports services at the Black Hills National Cemetery; the Veterans Outreach Centers in Rapid City and Martin, SD; and serves as the primary health care provider for the State Veterans Home in Hot Springs. VA Black Hills has sharing arrangements with Ellsworth Air Force Base, South Dakota Army National Guard, and many other community partners.

The Hot Springs VAMC consists of approximately 71 acre-parcel with total of 68 buildings, which includes 27 historic buildings.

Scope: The scope of this Firm Fixed Price contract is to engage a contractor to complete a market and feasibility study to determine the feasibility of executing an EUL housing project on the Hot Springs, SD campus for the Veterans and their families who are at risk of homelessness or are homeless. VA BHHCS is in the process of conducting a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) evaluation of various alternatives which would meet the Purpose and Need for provision of high quality, safe and accessible care closer to Veterans' homes throughout the VA BHHCS service area. The contractors for this PWS are to analyze the potential reuse of the VAMC facilities for an EUL housing project, which represents one possible re-use alternative under evaluation.

Objectives: The objective of this PWS is to conduct due diligence regarding an analysis of the real estate assets and formulate a draft market and feasibility study for EUL housing for Veterans or their families who are at risk of homelessness or are homeless on the Hot Springs, SD VAMC. The Contractor shall have expertise and provide all resources necessary to perform the specific requirements as defined in the PWS and as directed in this contract. The Contractor shall provide a detailed summary of its findings to include strategic, analytic, and outreach efforts that were taken to complete the study, which VA may need in order to design and implement optimal EUL initiatives and ensure progress towards meeting requirements and goals.

Period of Performance: Period of Performance for this contract is six months from date of award.

Type of Contract: This is a firm fixed contract.

Place of Performance: The primary place of performance will be at the Contractor's facilities; however, some task orders may require work to be performed at a Government facility. Any work at the Government site shall not take place on Federal holidays or weekends, unless directed by the Contracting Officer (CO).

CONTRACT AWARD MEETING

The Contractor shall not commence performance on the tasks in this PWS until the CO has conducted a kick-off meeting or has advised the Contractor that a kick-off meeting is waived.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

The following general requirements apply to this contract:

1. All written deliverables shall be phrased in layperson language. Statistical and other technical terminology shall not be used without providing a glossary of terms.
2. The following requirements apply: Where a written milestone deliverable is required in draft form, the VA will complete its review of the draft deliverable within 12 calendar days from date of receipt. The Contractor shall have 12 calendar days to deliver the final deliverable from date of receipt of the Government's comments.
3. The Contractor shall provide, via email, minutes of all Government-Contractor meetings. The Contractor shall provide these minutes within three calendar days after completion of the meeting.
4. Except for proprietary information in company quotes identified and marked in accordance with FAR 52.215-1(e), the Contractor shall not deliver to the Government any proprietary products or information of any type in completing the requirements of each task order PWS. The Contractor's internal development tools (that is, those development tools not developed for OAEM work and not required by OAEM to install, use, or revise the deliverables) are exempted from this requirement. If the Contractor believes an exception to this requirement is necessary for the effective or efficient execution of a task order, the Contractor shall request a specific exception, in writing, from the CO, and shall not use the proprietary tools or information in OAEM work until approval is received from the CO.
5. The Contractor shall ensure contract employees maintain an open and professional communication with the staff at the VA facilities. Complaints validated by the COR or VA staff will be reported in writing to the CO for action. If the Contractor fails to correct validated complaints raised by the COR and CO, it will be considered a failure in performance.
6. The CO may require the Contractor to meet with the CO, contract administrator, and other Government personnel at least quarterly, and as often as deemed necessary. The Contractor may request a meeting with the CO when deemed necessary.

SPECIFIC MANDATORY TASKS AND ASSOCIATED DELIVERABLES

Description of Tasks and Associated Deliverables:

- 1) For each task order awarded under this contract, the Contractor shall provide the specific deliverables described in the task order PWS, within the performance period stated. Specific sub-tasks and associated deliverables will be identified in each task order placed under the contract.
- 2) The selected Contractor shall have subject matter expertise and provide all resources necessary to perform the specific requirements as defined in the task order. Task order may include, but are not limited to, the following projects: market analysis, capital markets research, and legal review analysis for some or all of the items listed below.
 - a) **Task 1: Provide Project Management Plan**

The exact role will be defined by the task orders. Among other responsibilities related to this role.

1. Provide leadership and communicate with stakeholders per direction and coordination with COR.
2. Provide project planning and scheduling
3. Project manager shall coordinate contract project management activities to include:

- a. Performance monitoring and measurement
- b. Reporting and documentation associated with project/program objectives
- c. Stakeholders briefing (coordinated with COR)
- d. Project support, integration, and closeout service
4. Contract administration support to CORs.
5. The project manager shall monitor all contractor work performed under this contract. He/she will be responsible for providing status reports and monthly project reports to the COR.

The contractor shall provide a detailed Project Management Plan (PMP) and briefing for the OAEM project team. The PMP shall present the contractor's plan for completing the task order. The contractor's plan shall be responsive to the PWS and describe, in further detail, the approach to be used for each aspect of the task order as defined in the technical proposal. At a minimum, the PMP shall include the risk, quality, and technical management approach, work breakdown structure (WBS), detailed schedule, milestones, cost requirements, and proposed personnel. The contractor shall keep the PMP up to date throughout the period of performance.

The contractor shall provide written progress reports that include the order number and title of the project. The progress report shall cover all work completed during the preceding month, and work to be accomplished during the subsequent month. This report shall also identify any technical, quality, or cost problems that arose, identified risks and a statement explaining how the problem was resolved. This report shall also identify any problems that have arisen but have not been completely resolved, with an explanation. Outstanding problems/risks shall be reported until they are resolved. The COR may schedule progress briefings or conference calls within three working days after delivery of each progress report. The attendees may include VA managers and contractor key and subject matter expert personnel.

Task 2: Market and Feasibility Study

Describe the relevant and significant portions of history and background of the Site, the VA Medical Center, surrounding environments taking into account the EUL process for supportive housing for the Veterans and their families. Conduct a site inspection, as deemed necessary, and develop a property overview that gathers key site characteristics, confirms relevant data validity and identifies intrinsic site opportunities and constraints, and local patterns and market trends. Consider all master and long term goals for future planning on the Site and their effects. Include relevant survey maps and photographs of land and buildings. Discuss the sites physical limitations, configuration, transportation and access, existing infrastructure and utilities and the surrounding community. Develop a table of the major strengths and weaknesses of the Site and a surrounding use analysis. Develop a detailed Enhanced Use Lease Strategies based findings, conclusions and recommendations. Includes as an appendix a financial model with assumptions to substantiate market recommendations alternatives and any other requirements and regulations that may be needed in their entirety. The market study will include, but not limited to the following:

- Analysis of the real estate assets available for rehabilitation and reuse at the VAMC
- Identify general characteristics, size of, trends within, and markets
- Research legal and regulatory issues
- Primary Market Analysis
- Secondary Market Analysis
- Supply Analysis
- Demand analysis
- Capture Analysis
- Risks and Challenges
- Conclusion and recommendation
- Identify Sources of data

Task 3: The contractor will conduct project communication activities:

1. Conduct Contracting Officer's/COR kick-off meeting with VA officials via conference call or in person at the VA Central Office if local or travel at contractors own expense.
2. Conduct on-site kick-off meeting (optional)
3. Participate in bi-weekly conference calls with VA officials (maximum-12). Prepare and distribute meeting minutes within 5 days of conference call.
4. Prepare monthly status reports including current project status, outstanding activities and deliverables, milestone dates, and issues (maximum -6).

PERFORMANCE MEASURES

In accordance with Performance Based Service Contracts, Contractor(s) shall provide a Quality Assurance Plan ensuring that continued quality improvement to the program they are supporting is being made; a Metrics Plan shall also be provided demonstrating how Contractors will measure their performance identifying key factors that will be monitored by the Contractor and the Government. The Contractor is responsible for quality assurance of all services provided under the contract. Inspection by the Government does not relieve the Contractor of this responsibility. Contractors must also demonstrate how they will implement these plans and incorporate them into the local task orders they will receive from VA.

The Quality Assurance Plan should also include, as an option for VA consideration, the incentives and disincentives measures that can be taken by VA to reward exceptional performance and to also discipline vendors for less than satisfactory execution. Incentives and disincentives should be both monetary and non-monetary in nature. VA reserves the right to add and/or completely revise the submitted Quality Assurance, Metric, and incentive/disincentive plans that are to be included in the Contractors' submissions to this solicitation. The performance standards should at least include the following areas:

1. Management of price,
2. Schedule,
3. Technical quality,
4. Quality of project management, and
5. Relationship management.

PROGRAM MANAGEMENT

Upon completion of a task order, the ordering CO is required to document a performance review of the contracted services. The Project Manager will also conduct a post-performance assessment upon completion of each task order. The Project Manager will document the performance discussion in writing and provide a copy to the CO and the Contractor. The Government will address, at a minimum, the following areas in each task order assessment:

1. Quality of work performed,
2. Timeliness of work delivered,
3. Qualifications of staff providing services,
4. Management professionalism, and
5. Monitor actual costs versus contract cap based on required quarterly contract expenditure report from vendor(s).

The Contractor(s) shall provide a program management report on a quarterly basis to the VACO contracting officer's representative (COR) (who will be determined after award).

CONFLICT OF INTEREST PROVISION

(a) In responding to this solicitation, the Contractors' attention is directed to FAR Subpart 9.5, Organizational and Consultant Conflict of Interest.

- (b) The contracting officer views a potential conflict of interest could exist if the Contractor were to provide assistance under this contract for a particular site and then subsequently participated in any capacity with the proposed developer for the site.
- (c) The Contractor is therefore precluded from working with a developer on any site in which it provided services to VA, as described below.
- (d) The terms of the clause and the application of this subpart to the contract are not negotiable.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST CLAUSE

(a) As a condition of award, the Contractor's eligibility for future prime contract or subcontract awards will be restricted as follows:

The Contractor (to include principles, agents, and employees) is prohibited from performing services in any capacity on future commercial development or redevelopment of VA real property, subject to a task order (or task orders) issued under this contract. This restriction is for a period of five years and shall expire at the end of the 5th year following expiration or termination of this contract.

SCHEDULE FOR DELIVERABLES

See Attachment A Schedule of Deliverables.

1. Unless otherwise specified in the task order, the number of draft copies and the number of final copies shall be the same.
2. If for any reason the scheduled time for a deliverable cannot be met, the Contractor is required to explain why (include the original deliverable due date) in writing to the CO, including a firm commitment of when the work shall be completed. This notice to the CO shall cite the reasons for the delay, and the impact on the overall project. The CO will then review the facts and issue a response in accordance with applicable regulations.

CHANGES TO PERFORMANCE WORK STATEMENT

Any changes to this PWS shall be authorized and approved only through written correspondence from the CO. Costs incurred by the Contractor through the actions of parties other than the CO shall be borne by the Contractor.

TRAVEL

As required by each task order, the Contractor may be required to travel to Washington, D.C., or to other VA locations. Travel and per diem shall be reimbursed, if applicable, in accordance with the Joint Federal Travel Regulations. Each Contractor invoice must include copies of all receipts that support the travel costs claimed in the invoice. No General and Administrative (G&A) fees or costs, and no other fees or costs shall be added to travel expenses. Local travel within a 50-mile radius from the Contractor's facility is considered the cost of doing business and will not be reimbursed. This includes travel, subsistence, and associated labor charges for travel time. Travel performed for personal convenience and daily travel to and from work at the Contractor's facility will not be reimbursed. Travel, subsistence, and associated labor charges for travel time for travel beyond a 50-mile radius of the Contractor's facility are authorized on a case-by-case basis and must be pre-approved by the CO at least 30 calendar days in advance for the requested travel.

GOVERNMENT FURNISHED PROPERTY AND INFORMATION

Government Furnished Property and Information, if required, will be specified in each task order. Except for those items or services specifically stated to be Government furnished, the Contractor shall furnish everything required to perform task orders.

CONTRACTOR EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENTS—KEY PERSONNEL

These skilled experienced professional and/or technical personnel are essential for successful Contractor accomplishment of the work to be performed under this contract and subsequent task orders and options. The Contractor shall include in the technical proposal for each task order the résumés on all proposed professional and/or technical personnel who will perform the tasks in the task order. Résumés are not required for clerical

personnel. The personnel whose résumés are submitted are defined as key personnel. The Contractor agrees that the key personnel listed below shall not be removed, diverted, or replaced from work without approval of the CO and COR.

Any personnel the Contractor offers as substitutes shall have the ability and qualifications equal to or better than the key personnel that are being replaced. Requests to substitute personnel shall be approved by the COR and the CO. All requests for approval of substitutions in personnel shall be submitted to the COR and the CO at least 30 calendar days prior to making any change in key personnel. The request shall be written and provide a detailed explanation of the circumstances necessitating the proposed substitution. The Contractor shall submit a complete résumé for the proposed substitute, any changes to the rate specified in the order (as applicable) and any other information requested by the CO needed to approve or disapprove the proposed substitution. The CO will evaluate such requests and promptly notify the Contractor of approval or disapproval thereof in writing.

Note:

1. Personnel assigned by the Contractor to perform work on this contract shall be acceptable to VA in terms of personal and professional conduct and technical knowledge. The CO may notify the Contractor and request that a person be immediately removed from assignment on this contract should any Contractor personnel be determined to be unacceptable in terms of technical competency or personal conduct during duty hours. The Contractor shall immediately remove and replace the unacceptable on-site personnel at no additional costs to the Government. Replacement personnel qualifications shall be equal to or greater than those of the personnel being replaced. Employment and staffing difficulties shall not be justification for failure to meet established schedules.
2. Contractor personnel shall be fluent and communicate in the English language, both written and oral communication.
3. The Contractor shall not employ any person who is an employee of the United States Government, if the employment of that person would create a conflict of interest.

2. The Contractor and their personnel shall be subject to the same Federal laws, regulations, standards and VA policies as VA personnel, regarding information and information system security. These include, but are not limited to Federal Information Security Management Act (FISMA), Appendix III of OMB Circular A-130, and guidance and standards, available from the Department of Commerce's National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST). 3. To ensure that appropriate security controls are in place, Contractors must follow the procedures set forth in "VA Information and Information System Security/Privacy Requirements for IT Contracts" located at the following Web site: <http://www.iprm.oit.va.gov>.
4. These provisions shall apply to all contracts in which VA sensitive information is stored, generated, transmitted, or exchanged by VA, a Contractor, subcontractor or a third-party, or on behalf of any of these entities regardless of format or whether it resides on a VA system or Contractor/subcontractor's electronic information system(s) operating for or on the VA's behalf.

The COR will provide the Contractor a Background Investigation Request Worksheet within 2 days of task order award listing the place of performance, type of investigation requested, the VA sponsor and requesting the applicant's name, date of birth, social security number, company name and point of contact and other required data.
8. The Contractor shall complete the Background Investigation Request worksheet and return it to the COR within five days of receipt. The COR will review the documents and forward them to the Security Investigations Center (SIC).
9. The CIS will send an email notification to the Contractor identifying the website link that includes detailed instructions regarding completion of the background clearance application process and what level of background was requested. Upon receipt of required investigative documents, SIC will review the investigative documents for completion and initiate the background investigation by forwarding the investigative documents to OPM to conduct the background investigation.
10. The COR will notify the Contractor when the investigation has been favorably or unfavorably completed and adjudicated by the Government. The Contractor, when notified of an unfavorable determination by the Government, shall withdraw the employee from consideration from working under the contract.
11. The Contractor shall not commence performance prior to the initiation of the process that requests the appropriate investigative action be taken. During the time required to conduct the appropriate investigation, the Contractor shall be responsible for the actions of its respective employees until official notification of a favorable determination is received from the Office of Security and Law Enforcement.
12. Failure to comply with the Contractor personnel security requirements may result in termination of the contract for default.

CONFIDENTIALITY AND NONDISCLOSURE

It is agreed that:

1. The preliminary and final deliverables and all associated working papers, application source code, and other material deemed relevant by the VA which have been generated by the Contractor in the performance of this task order are the exclusive property of the U.S. Government and shall be submitted to the COR at the conclusion of the task order.
2. The CO will be the sole authorized official to release verbally or in writing, any data, the draft deliverables, the final deliverables, or any other written or printed materials pertaining to this task order. No information shall be released by the Contractor. Any request for information relating to this task order presented to the Contractor shall be submitted to the CO for response.
3. Press releases, marketing material or any other printed or electronic documentation related to this project, shall not be publicized without the written approval of the CO.

C.2 52.204-7 CENTRAL CONTRACTOR REGISTRATION (APRIL 2008)

(a) Definitions. As used in this clause—

“Central Contractor Registration (CCR) database” means the primary Government repository for Contractor information required for the conduct of business with the Government.

“Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number” means the 9-digit number assigned by Dun and Bradstreet, Inc. (D&B) to identify unique business entities.

“Data Universal Numbering System+4 (DUNS+4) number” means the DUNS number means the number assigned by D&B plus a 4-character suffix that may be assigned by a business concern. (D&B has no affiliation with this 4-character suffix.) This 4-character suffix may be assigned at the discretion of the business concern to establish additional CCR records for identifying alternative Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) accounts (see the FAR at Subpart 32.11) for the same concern.

“Registered in the CCR database” means that—

- (1) The Contractor has entered all mandatory information, including the DUNS number or the DUNS+4 number, into the CCR database; and
- (2) The Government has validated all mandatory data fields, to include validation of the Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN) with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), and has marked the record “Active”. The Contractor will be required to provide consent for TIN validation to the Government as a part of the CCR registration process.

(b)

- (1) By submission of an offer, the offeror acknowledges the requirement that a prospective awardee shall be registered in the CCR database prior to award, during performance, and through final payment of any contract, basic agreement, basic ordering agreement, or blanket purchasing agreement resulting from this solicitation.
- (2) The offeror shall enter, in the block with its name and address on the cover page of its offer, the annotation “DUNS” or “DUNS+4” followed by the DUNS or DUNS+4 number that identifies the offeror’s name and address exactly as stated in the offer. The DUNS number will be used by the Contracting Officer to verify that the offeror is registered in the CCR database.

(c) If the offeror does not have a DUNS number, it should contact Dun and Bradstreet directly to obtain one.

(1) An offeror may obtain a DUNS number—

- (i) Via the internet at <http://fedgov.dnb.com/webform> or if the offeror does not have internet access, it may call Dun and Bradstreet at 1-866-705-5711 if located within the United States; or
- (ii) If located outside the United States, by contacting the local Dun and Bradstreet office. The offeror should indicate that it is an offeror for a U.S. Government contract when contacting the local Dun and Bradstreet office.

(2) The offeror should be prepared to provide the following information:

- (i) Company legal business name.
- (ii) Tradestyle, doing business, or other name by which your entity is commonly recognized.
- (iii) Company physical street address, city, state and Zip Code.
- (iv) Company mailing address, city, state and Zip Code (if separate from physical).

- (v) Company telephone number.
- (vi) Date the company was started.
- (vii) Number of employees at your location.
- (viii) Chief executive officer/key manager.
- (ix) Line of business (industry).
- (x) Company Headquarters name and address (reporting relationship within your entity).

(d) If the Offeror does not become registered in the CCR database in the time prescribed by the Contracting Officer, the Contracting Officer will proceed to award to the next otherwise successful registered Offeror.

(e) Processing time, which normally takes 48 hours, should be taken into consideration when registering. Offerors who are not registered should consider applying for registration immediately upon receipt of this solicitation.

(f) The Contractor is responsible for the accuracy and completeness of the data within the CCR database, and for any liability resulting from the Government's reliance on inaccurate or incomplete data. To remain registered in the CCR database after the initial registration, the Contractor is required to review and update on an annual basis from the date of initial registration or subsequent updates its information in the CCR database to ensure it is current, accurate and complete. Updating information in the CCR does not alter the terms and conditions of this contract and is not a substitute for a properly executed contractual document.

(g)

(1)

(i) If a Contractor has legally changed its business name, "doing business as" name, or division name (whichever is shown on the contract), or has transferred the assets used in performing the contract, but has not completed the necessary requirements regarding novation and change-of-name agreements in Subpart 42.12, the Contractor shall provide the responsible Contracting Officer a minimum of one business day's written notification of its intention to:

(A) Change the name in the CCR database;

(B) Comply with the requirements of Subpart 42.12 of the FAR;

(C) Agree in writing to the timeline and procedures specified by the responsible Contracting Officer. The Contractor must provide with the notification sufficient documentation to support the legally changed name.

(ii) If the Contractor fails to comply with the requirements of paragraph (g)(1)(i) of this clause, or fails to perform the agreement at paragraph (g)(1)(i)(C) of this clause, and, in the absence of a properly executed novation or change-of-name agreement, the CCR information that shows the Contractor to be other than the Contractor indicated in the contract will be considered to be incorrect information within the meaning of the "Suspension of Payment" paragraph of the electronic funds transfer (EFT) clause of this contract.

(2) The Contractor shall not change the name or address for EFT payments or manual payments, as appropriate, in the CCR record to reflect an assignee for the purpose of assignment of claims (see FAR Subpart 32.8, Assignment of Claims). Assignees shall be separately registered in the CCR database. Information provided to the Contractor's CCR record that indicates payments, including those made by EFT, to an ultimate recipient other than that Contractor will be considered to be incorrect information within the meaning of the "Suspension of payment" paragraph of the EFT clause of this contract.

C.3 52.212-4 CONTRACT TERMS AND CONDITIONS--COMMERCIAL ITEMS (Sept 2013)

(a) *Inspection/Acceptance.* The Contractor shall only tender for acceptance those items that conform to the requirements of this contract. The Government reserves the right to inspect or test any supplies or services that have been tendered for acceptance. The Government may require repair or replacement of nonconforming supplies or reperformance of nonconforming services at no increase in contract price. If repair/replacement or reperformance will not correct the defects or is not possible, the Government may seek an equitable price reduction or adequate consideration for acceptance of nonconforming supplies or services. The Government must exercise its post-acceptance rights—

(1) Within a reasonable time after the defect was discovered or should have been discovered; and

(2) Before any substantial change occurs in the condition of the item, unless the change is due to the defect in the item.

(b) *Assignment.* The Contractor or its assignee may assign its rights to receive payment due as a result of performance of this contract to a bank, trust company, or other financing institution, including any Federal lending agency in accordance with the Assignment of Claims Act (31 U.S.C. 3727). However, when a third party makes payment (e.g., use of the Governmentwide commercial purchase card), the Contractor may not assign its rights to receive payment under this contract.

(c) *Changes.* Changes in the terms and conditions of this contract may be made only by written agreement of the parties.

(d) *Disputes.* This contract is subject to the Contract Disputes Act of 1978, as amended (41 U.S.C. 601-613). Failure of the parties to this contract to reach agreement on any request for equitable adjustment, claim, appeal or action arising under or relating to this contract shall be a dispute to be resolved in accordance with the clause at FAR 52.233-1, Disputes, which is incorporated herein by reference. The Contractor shall proceed diligently with performance of this contract, pending final resolution of any dispute arising under the contract.

(e) *Definitions.* The clause at FAR 52.202-1, Definitions, is incorporated herein by reference.

(f) *Excusable delays.* The Contractor shall be liable for default unless nonperformance is caused by an occurrence beyond the reasonable control of the Contractor and without its fault or negligence such as, acts of God or the public enemy, acts of the Government in either its sovereign or contractual capacity, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, strikes, unusually severe weather, and delays of common carriers. The Contractor shall notify the Contracting Officer in writing as soon as it is reasonably possible after the commencement of any excusable delay, setting forth the full particulars in connection therewith, shall remedy such occurrence with all reasonable dispatch, and shall promptly give written notice to the Contracting Officer of the cessation of such occurrence.

(g) *Invoice.*

(1) The Contractor shall submit an original invoice and three copies (or electronic invoice, if authorized) to the address designated in the contract to receive invoices. An invoice must include—

(i) Name and address of the Contractor;

- (ii) Invoice date and number;
- (iii) Contract number, contract line item number and, if applicable, the order number;
- (iv) Description, quantity, unit of measure, unit price and extended price of the items delivered;
- (v) Shipping number and date of shipment, including the bill of lading number and weight of shipment if shipped on Government bill of lading;
- (vi) Terms of any discount for prompt payment offered;
- (vii) Name and address of official to whom payment is to be sent;
- (viii) Name, title, and phone number of person to notify in event of defective invoice; and
- (ix) Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN). The Contractor shall include its TIN on the invoice only if required elsewhere in this contract.

- (x) Electronic funds transfer (EFT) banking information.

- (A) The Contractor shall include EFT banking information on the invoice only if required elsewhere in this contract.

- (B) If EFT banking information is not required to be on the invoice, in order for the invoice to be a proper invoice, the Contractor shall have submitted correct EFT banking information in accordance with the applicable solicitation provision, contract clause (*e.g.*, 52.232-33, Payment by Electronic Funds Transfer—System for Award Management, or 52.232-34, Payment by Electronic Funds Transfer—Other Than System for Award Management), or applicable agency procedures.

- (C) EFT banking information is not required if the Government waived the requirement to pay by EFT.

(2) Invoices will be handled in accordance with the Prompt Payment Act (31 U.S.C. 3903) and Office of Management and Budget (OMB) prompt payment regulations at 5 CFR Part 1315.

(h) *Patent indemnity.* The Contractor shall indemnify the Government and its officers, employees and agents against liability, including costs, for actual or alleged direct or contributory infringement of, or inducement to infringe, any United States or foreign patent, trademark or copyright, arising out of the performance of this contract, provided the Contractor is reasonably notified of such claims and proceedings.

(i) Payment.—

- (1) *Items accepted.* Payment shall be made for items accepted by the Government that have been delivered to the delivery destinations set forth in this contract.

- (2) *Prompt payment.* The Government will make payment in accordance with the Prompt Payment Act (31 U.S.C. 3903) and prompt payment regulations at 5 CFR Part 1315.

- (3) *Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT).* If the Government makes payment by EFT, see 52.212-5(b) for the appropriate EFT clause.

- (4) *Discount.* In connection with any discount offered for early payment, time shall be computed from the date of the invoice. For the purpose of computing the discount earned, payment shall be considered to have been made on the date which appears on the payment check or the specified payment date if an electronic funds transfer payment is made.

- (5) *Overpayments.* If the Contractor becomes aware of a duplicate contract financing or invoice payment or that the Government has otherwise overpaid on a contract financing or invoice payment, the Contractor shall—

- (i) Remit the overpayment amount to the payment office cited in the contract along with a description of the overpayment including the—

(A) Circumstances of the overpayment (*e.g.*, duplicate payment, erroneous payment, liquidation errors, date(s) of overpayment);

(B) Affected contract number and delivery order number, if applicable;

(C) Affected contract line item or subline item, if applicable; and

(D) Contractor point of contact.

(ii) Provide a copy of the remittance and supporting documentation to the Contracting Officer.

(6) *Interest.*

(i) All amounts that become payable by the Contractor to the Government under this contract shall bear simple interest from the date due until paid unless paid within 30 days of becoming due. The interest rate shall be the interest rate established by the Secretary of the Treasury as provided in Section 611 of the Contract Disputes Act of 1978 (Public Law 95-563), which is applicable to the period in which the amount becomes due, as provided in (i)(6)(v) of this clause, and then at the rate applicable for each six-month period as fixed by the Secretary until the amount is paid.

(ii) The Government may issue a demand for payment to the Contractor upon finding a debt is due under the contract.

(iii) *Final decisions.* The Contracting Officer will issue a final decision as required by 33.211 if—

(A) The Contracting Officer and the Contractor are unable to reach agreement on the existence or amount of a debt within 30 days;

(B) The Contractor fails to liquidate a debt previously demanded by the Contracting Officer within the timeline specified in the demand for payment unless the amounts were not repaid because the Contractor has requested an installment payment agreement; or

(C) The Contractor requests a deferment of collection on a debt previously demanded by the Contracting Officer (see 32.607-2).

(iv) If a demand for payment was previously issued for the debt, the demand for payment included in the final decision shall identify the same due date as the original demand for payment.

(v) Amounts shall be due at the earliest of the following dates:

(A) The date fixed under this contract.

(B) The date of the first written demand for payment, including any demand for payment resulting from a default termination.

(vi) The interest charge shall be computed for the actual number of calendar days involved beginning on the due date and ending on—

(A) The date on which the designated office receives payment from the Contractor;

(B) The date of issuance of a Government check to the Contractor from which an amount otherwise payable has been withheld as a credit against the contract debt; or

(C) The date on which an amount withheld and applied to the contract debt would otherwise have become payable to the Contractor.

(vii) The interest charge made under this clause may be reduced under the procedures prescribed in 32.608-2 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation in effect on the date of this contract.

(j) *Risk of loss.* Unless the contract specifically provides otherwise, risk of loss or damage to the supplies provided under this contract shall remain with the Contractor until, and shall pass to the Government upon:

(1) Delivery of the supplies to a carrier, if transportation is f.o.b. origin; or

(2) Delivery of the supplies to the Government at the destination specified in the contract, if transportation is f.o.b. destination.

(k) *Taxes.* The contract price includes all applicable Federal, State, and local taxes and duties.

(l) *Termination for the Government's convenience.* The Government reserves the right to terminate this contract, or any part hereof, for its sole convenience. In the event of such termination, the Contractor shall immediately stop all work hereunder and shall immediately cause any and all of its suppliers and subcontractors to cease work. Subject to the terms of this contract, the Contractor shall be paid a percentage of the contract price reflecting the percentage of the work performed prior to the notice of termination, plus reasonable charges the Contractor can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Government using its standard record keeping system, have resulted from the termination. The Contractor shall not be required to comply with the cost accounting standards or contract cost principles for this purpose. This paragraph does not give the Government any right to audit the Contractor's records. The Contractor shall not be paid for any work performed or costs incurred which reasonably could have been avoided.

(m) *Termination for cause.* The Government may terminate this contract, or any part hereof, for cause in the event of any default by the Contractor, or if the Contractor fails to comply with any contract terms and conditions, or fails to provide the Government, upon request, with adequate assurances of future performance. In the event of termination for cause, the Government shall not be liable to the Contractor for any amount for supplies or services not accepted, and the Contractor shall be liable to the Government for any and all rights and remedies provided by law. If it is determined that the Government improperly terminated this contract for default, such termination shall be deemed a termination for convenience.

(n) *Title.* Unless specified elsewhere in this contract, title to items furnished under this contract shall pass to the Government upon acceptance, regardless of when or where the Government takes physical possession.

(o) *Warranty.* The Contractor warrants and implies that the items delivered hereunder are merchantable and fit for use for the particular purpose described in this contract.

(p) *Limitation of liability.* Except as otherwise provided by an express warranty, the Contractor will not be liable to the Government for consequential damages resulting from any defect or deficiencies in accepted items.

(q) *Other compliances.* The Contractor shall comply with all applicable Federal, State and local laws, executive orders, rules and regulations applicable to its performance under this contract.

(r) *Compliance with laws unique to Government contracts.* The Contractor agrees to comply with 31 U.S.C. 1352 relating to limitations on the use of appropriated funds to influence certain Federal contracts; 18 U.S.C. 431 relating to officials not to benefit; 40 U.S.C. 3701, *et seq.*, Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act; 41 U.S.C. 51-58, Anti-Kickback Act of 1986; 41 U.S.C. 4712 and 10 U.S.C. 2409 relating to whistleblower protections; 49 U.S.C. 40118, Fly American; and 41 U.S.C. 423 relating to procurement integrity.

(s) *Order of precedence.* Any inconsistencies in this solicitation or contract shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order:

- (1) The schedule of supplies/services.
- (2) The Assignments, Disputes, Payments, Invoice, Other Compliances, Compliance with Laws Unique to Government Contracts, and Unauthorized Obligations paragraphs of this clause;
- (3) The clause at 52.212-5.
- (4) Addenda to this solicitation or contract, including any license agreements for computer software.
- (5) Solicitation provisions if this is a solicitation.
- (6) Other paragraphs of this clause.
- (7) The Standard Form 1449.
- (8) Other documents, exhibits, and attachments.

(9) The specification.

(t) System for Award Management (SAM).

(1) Unless exempted by an addendum to this contract, the Contractor is responsible during performance and through final payment of any contract for the accuracy and completeness of the data within the SAM database, and for any liability resulting from the Government's reliance on inaccurate or incomplete data. To remain registered in the SAM database after the initial registration, the Contractor is required to review and update on an annual basis from the date of initial registration or subsequent updates its information in the SAM database to ensure it is current, accurate and complete. Updating information in the SAM does not alter the terms and conditions of this contract and is not a substitute for a properly executed contractual document.

(2)(i) If a Contractor has legally changed its business name, "doing business as" name, or division name (whichever is shown on the contract), or has transferred the assets used in performing the contract, but has not completed the necessary requirements regarding novation and change-of-name agreements in FAR Subpart 42.12, the Contractor shall provide the responsible Contracting Officer a minimum of one business day's written notification of its intention to (A) change the name in the SAM database; (B) comply with the requirements of Subpart 42.12; and (C) agree in writing to the timeline and procedures specified by the responsible Contracting Officer. The Contractor must provide with the notification sufficient documentation to support the legally changed name.

(ii) If the Contractor fails to comply with the requirements of paragraph (t)(2)(i) of this clause, or fails to perform the agreement at paragraph (t)(2)(i)(C) of this clause, and, in the absence of a properly executed novation or change-of-name agreement, the SAM information that shows the Contractor to be other than the Contractor indicated in the contract will be considered to be incorrect information within the meaning of the "Suspension of Payment" paragraph of the electronic funds transfer (EFT) clause of this contract.

(3) The Contractor shall not change the name or address for EFT payments or manual payments, as appropriate, in the SAM record to reflect an assignee for the purpose of assignment of claims (see Subpart 32.8, Assignment of Claims). Assignees shall be separately registered in the SAM database. Information provided to the Contractor's SAM record that indicates payments, including those made by EFT, to an ultimate recipient other than that Contractor will be considered to be incorrect information within the meaning of the "Suspension of payment" paragraph of the EFT clause of this contract.

(4) Offerors and Contractors may obtain information on registration and annual confirmation requirements via SAM accessed through <https://www.acquisition.gov>.

(u) Unauthorized Obligations

(1) Except as stated in paragraph (u)(2) of this clause, when any supply or service acquired under this contract is subject to any End User License Agreement (EULA), Terms of Service (TOS), or similar legal instrument or agreement, that includes any clause requiring the Government to indemnify the Contractor or any person or entity for damages, costs, fees, or any other loss or liability that would create an Anti-Deficiency Act violation (31 U.S.C. 1341), the following shall govern:

(i) Any such clause is unenforceable against the Government.

(ii) Neither the Government nor any Government authorized end user shall be deemed to have agreed to such clause by virtue of it appearing in the EULA, TOS, or similar legal instrument or agreement. (iv) The business has been verified for ownership and control and is so listed in the Vendor Information Pages database, (<http://www.VetBiz.gov>).

(2) “Service-disabled veteran” means a veteran, as defined in 38 U.S.C. 101(2), with a disability that is service-connected, as defined in 38 U.S.C. 101(16).

(b) *General.* (1) Offers are solicited only from service-disabled veteran-owned small business concerns. Offers received from concerns that are not service-disabled veteran-owned small business concerns shall not be considered.

(2) Any award resulting from this solicitation shall be made to a service-disabled veteran-owned small business concern.

(c) Agreement. A service-disabled veteran-owned small business concern agrees that in the performance of the contract, in the case of a contract for:

(1) Services (except construction), at least 50 percent of the cost of personnel for contract performance will be spent for employees of the concern or employees of other eligible service-disabled veteran-owned small business concerns;

(2) Supplies (other than acquisition from a nonmanufacturer of the supplies), at least 50 percent of the cost of manufacturing, excluding the cost of materials, will be performed by the concern or other eligible service-disabled veteran-owned small business concerns;

(d) A joint venture may be considered a service-disabled veteran owned small business concern if—

(1) At least one member of the joint venture is a service-disabled veteran-owned small business concern, and makes the following representations: That it is a service-disabled veteran-owned small business concern,

and that it is a small business concern under the North American Industry Classification Systems (NAICS) code assigned to the procurement;

(2) Each other concern is small under the size standard corresponding to the NAICS code assigned to the procurement; and

(3) The joint venture meets the requirements of paragraph 7 of the explanation of Affiliates in 19.101 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation.

(4) The joint venture meets the requirements of 13 CFR 125.15(b).

(e) Any service-disabled veteran-owned small business concern (non-manufacturer) must meet the requirements in 19.102(f) of the Federal Acquisition Regulation to receive a benefit under this program.

C.11 VAAR 852.237-70 CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES (APR 1984)

The contractor shall obtain all necessary licenses and/or permits required to perform this work. He/she shall take all reasonable precautions necessary to protect persons and property from injury or damage during the performance of this contract. He/she shall be responsible for any injury to himself/herself, his/her employees, as well as for any damage to personal or public property that occurs during the performance of this contract that is caused by his/her employee's fault or negligence, and shall maintain personal liability and property damage insurance having coverage for a limit as required by the laws of the State of see list of States . Further, it is agreed that any negligence of the Government, its officers, agents, servants and employees, shall not be the responsibility of the contractor hereunder with the regard to any claims, loss, damage, injury and liability resulting there from.

C.12 VAAR 852.273-75 SECURITY REQUIREMENTS FOR UNCLASSIFIED INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY RESOURCES.

As prescribed in 839.201, insert the following clause:

SECURITY REQUIREMENTS FOR UNCLASSIFIED INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY RESOURCES (Interim - OCT 2008)

(a) The contractor and their personnel shall be subject to the same Federal laws, regulations, standards and VA policies as VA personnel, regarding information and information system security. These include, but are not limited to Federal Information Security Management Act (FISMA), Appendix III of OMB Circular A-130, and guidance and standards, available from the Department of Commerce's National Institute of

Standards and Technology (NIST). This also includes the use of common security configurations available from NIST's Web site at: <http://checklists.nist.gov/>.

(b) To ensure that appropriate security controls are in place, Contractors must follow the procedures set forth in “*VA Information and Information System Security/Privacy Requirements for IT Contracts*” located at the following Web site: <http://www.iprm.oit.va.gov/>.

SECTION D - CONTRACT PROVISION

D.1 52.212-1 INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFERORS—COMMERCIAL ITEMS (JUNE 2008)

(a) *North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) code and small business size standard.* The NAICS code and small business size standard for this acquisition appear in Block 10 of the solicitation cover sheet (SF 1449). However, the small business size standard for a concern which submits an offer in its own name, but which proposes to furnish an item which it did not itself manufacture, is 500 employees.

(b) *Submission of offers.* Submit signed and dated offers to the office specified in this solicitation at or before the exact time specified in this solicitation. Offers may be submitted on the SF 1449, letterhead stationery, or as otherwise specified in the solicitation. As a minimum, offers must show—

- (1) The solicitation number;
- (2) The time specified in the solicitation for receipt of offers;
- (3) The name, address, and telephone number of the offeror;
- (4) A technical description of the items being offered in sufficient detail to evaluate compliance with the requirements in the solicitation. This may include product literature, or other documents, if necessary;
- (5) Terms of any express warranty;
- (6) Price and any discount terms;
- (7) “Remit to” address, if different than mailing address;
- (8) A completed copy of the representations and certifications at FAR 52.212-3 (see FAR 52.212-3(b) for those representations and certifications that the offeror shall complete electronically);
- (9) Acknowledgment of Solicitation Amendments;
- (10) Past performance information, when included as an evaluation factor, to include recent and relevant contracts for the same or similar items and other references (including contract numbers, points of contact with telephone numbers and other relevant information); and
- (11) If the offer is not submitted on the SF 1449, include a statement specifying the extent of agreement with all terms, conditions, and provisions included in the solicitation. Offers that fail to furnish required representations or information, or reject the terms and conditions of the solicitation may be excluded from consideration.

(c) *Period for acceptance of offers.* The offeror agrees to hold the prices in its offer firm for 30 calendar days from the date specified for receipt of offers, unless another time period is specified in an addendum to the solicitation.

(d) *Product samples.* When required by the solicitation, product samples shall be submitted at or prior to the time specified for receipt of offers. Unless otherwise specified in this solicitation, these samples shall be submitted at no expense to the Government, and returned at the sender’s request and expense, unless they are destroyed during preaward testing.

(e) *Multiple offers.* Offerors are encouraged to submit multiple offers presenting alternative terms and conditions or commercial items for satisfying the requirements of this solicitation. Each offer submitted will be evaluated separately.

(f) Late submissions, modifications, revisions, and withdrawals of offers.

(1) Offerors are responsible for submitting offers, and any modifications, revisions, or withdrawals, so as to reach the Government office designated in the solicitation by the time specified in the solicitation. If no

time is specified in the solicitation, the time for receipt is 4:30 p.m., local time, for the designated Government office on the date that offers or revisions are due.

(2)(i) Any offer, modification, revision, or withdrawal of an offer received at the Government office designated in the solicitation after the exact time specified for receipt of offers is “late” and will not be considered unless it is received before award is made, the Contracting Officer determines that accepting the late offer would not unduly delay the acquisition; and—

(A) If it was transmitted through an electronic commerce method authorized by the solicitation, it was received at the initial point of entry to the Government infrastructure not later than 5:00 p.m. one working day prior to the date specified for receipt of offers; or

(B) There is acceptable evidence to establish that it was received at the Government installation designated for receipt of offers and was under the Government’s control prior to the time set for receipt of offers; or

(C) If this solicitation is a request for proposals, it was the only proposal received.

(ii) However, a late modification of an otherwise successful offer, that makes its terms more favorable to the Government, will be considered at any time it is received and may be accepted.

(3) Acceptable evidence to establish the time of receipt at the Government installation includes the time/date stamp of that installation on the offer wrapper, other documentary evidence of receipt maintained by the installation, or oral testimony or statements of Government personnel.

Therefore, the offeror’s initial offer should contain the offeror’s best terms from a price and technical standpoint. However, the Government reserves the right to conduct discussions if later determined by the Contracting Officer to be necessary. The Government may reject any or all offers if such action is in the public interest; accept other than the lowest offer; and waive informalities and minor irregularities in offers received.

(h) *Multiple awards*. The Government may accept any item or group of items of an offer, unless the offeror qualifies the offer by specific limitations. Unless otherwise provided in the Schedule, offers may not be submitted for quantities less than those specified. The Government reserves the right to make an award on any item for a quantity less than the quantity offered, at the unit prices offered, unless the offeror specifies otherwise in the offer.

D.2 VAAR 852.209-70 ORGANIZATIONAL CONFLICTS OF INTEREST (JAN 2008)

(a) It is in the best interest of the Government to avoid situations which might create an organizational conflict of interest or where the offeror's performance of work under the contract may provide the contractor with an unfair competitive advantage. The term "organizational conflict of interest" means that because of other activities or relationships with other persons, a person is unable to render impartial assistance or advice to the Government, or the person's objectivity in performing the contract work is or might be otherwise impaired, or the person has an unfair competitive advantage.

(b) The offeror shall provide a statement with its offer which describes, in a concise manner, all relevant facts concerning any past, present, or currently planned interest (financial, contractual, organizational, or otherwise) or actual or potential organizational conflicts of interest relating to the services to be provided under this solicitation. The offeror shall also provide statements with its offer containing the same information for any consultants and subcontractors identified in its proposal and which will provide services under the solicitation. The offeror may also provide relevant facts that show how its organizational and/or management system or other actions would avoid or mitigate any actual or potential organizational conflicts of interest.

(c) Based on this information and any other information solicited or obtained by the contracting officer, the contracting officer may determine that an organizational conflict of interest exists which would warrant disqualifying the contractor for award of the contract unless the organizational conflict of interest can be mitigated to the contracting officer's satisfaction by negotiating terms and conditions of the contract to that effect. If the conflict of interest cannot be mitigated and if the contracting officer finds that it is in the best interest of the United States to award the contract, the contracting officer shall request a waiver in accordance with FAR 9.503 and 48 CFR 809.503.

(d) Nondisclosure or misrepresentation of actual or potential organizational conflicts of interest at the time of the offer, or arising as a result of a modification to the contract, may result in the termination of the contract at no expense to the Government.

- (1) Include the name, address, fax number, and telephone number of the protester;
- (2) Identify the solicitation and/or contract number;
- (3) Include an original signed by the protester or the protester's representative and at least one copy;
- (4) Set forth a detailed statement of the legal and factual grounds of the protest, including a description of resulting prejudice to the protester, and provide copies of relevant documents;
- (5) Specifically request a ruling of the individual upon whom the protest is served;
- (6) State the form of relief requested; and
- (7) Provide all information establishing the timeliness of the protest.

(b) Failure to comply with the above may result in dismissal of the protest without further consideration.

(c) Bidders/offerors and contracting officers are encouraged to use alternative dispute resolution (ADR) procedures to resolve protests at any stage in the protest process. If ADR is used, the Department of Veterans Affairs will not furnish any documentation in an ADR proceeding beyond what is allowed by the Federal Acquisition Regulation.

Evaluation Factors

Quotations will be reviewed and evaluated in accordance with the evaluation criteria explained below. The following description summarizes the relationship of the factors to each other. The evaluation factors in order of precedence are:

1. Technical Approach which is comprised of the following subfactors in descending order of importance: A. Understanding of the Requirements, B. Personnel—Qualifications and Experience, C. Corporate Capability and Stability
2. Past Performance
3. Price

The technical approach factor is significantly more important than past performance, and past performance is significantly more important than Veteran's involvement. All technical factors when combined are significantly more important than price.

Offerors' quotations will be written submissions and will consist of two volumes.

Volume I b	Past Performance
Volume II	Solicitation/RFQ with completed Schedules of Prices and associated tables; completed fill-ins in Contract Administration Data; Representations, Certifications, and Other Statements of Offerors

Documentation demonstrates that the Offeror has the longevity, size, scope, reputation, and financial stability to maintain capability and perform the requirements throughout the entire period of the BPA.

Note: Overall Factor Rating for Technical Approach

During evaluation, VA intends to give credit for exceeding the minimum requirements, as explained in the table below:

Blue	Outstanding	The factor clearly meets and consistently exceeds the Government's stated requirements in all areas in a manner beneficial to the Government. The information provided suggests a very low risk of less than satisfactory performance on the part of the offeror.

2. PAST PERFORMANCE

The Offeror will be evaluated on their past performance. Offeror shall submit three references for recent (from the past three years) and relevant experience (i.e., experience in providing the services as described by the Performance Work Statement contained in the solicitation and services that are similar in scope). For

Past Performance, the information used shall consist of reference data provided by the Offeror in their proposal submission, information in both Government and commercial databases

3. PRICE

This Volume shall be organized in such a manner to address and/or provide sufficient details in price breakdown of the quotation. Information must be detailed enough to clearly document that the proposed mix of labor categories, the labor category rates, and the discounted rates offered are accurate, realistic, complete, and consistent with the proposed technical volume and with the requirements of the PWS. Documentation shall also explain any description of any assumption of terms and conditions, as well as a specific description of any pricing and technical assumptions that the response is predicated on.

Quotations which are unrealistic in terms of technical commitment or unrealistically low in price will be deemed to show an inherent lack of technical competence or failure to comprehend the complexity and risk of the contract requirements. This may be grounds for the rejection of the quotation. The Government may reject any quotation that is unreasonable or materially unbalanced as to prices. An unbalanced quotation is one that incorporates prices significantly less than cost for some items and/or prices that are significantly overstated for other items.

This will be a single award. This Contract award shall be made to the responsible Quoter whose offer, in conforming to this RFQ, is most advantageous to the Government, price and other factors considered. The Government reserves the right to award without discussions.
